


An important pre-literacy skill is the ability to identify capital and lowercase letter names, as well as the letter sounds. These cards can be used in several ways to help children learn the names and sounds of the letters.


All activities below can be used with a few letter cards at a time to make it an appropriate level for children just learning their alphabet. For example, children brand new to learning the alphabet might only use the letter A, B, and C cards. As children learn more letters, more letter cards can be added.


Activities:


- 1. Match capital and lowercase letters with letters face side up to check to see if your child knows the matches.
- 2. Match capital and lowercase letters with face down to create a memory game and practice capital and lowercase letter matching.
- 3. Play Go Fish. The capital, lowercase, and 2 pictures would be a set. For example, A, a, alligator, and apple would be a set.
- 4. Hide cards throughout a room. Ask the child to find a card with a certain letter or sound. For example, find letter a.
- 5. Have the child place letters or pictures in ABC order.
- 6. Place five cards in front of the child. Four of the five would match (A, a, alligator, apple) and one would not (zebra). Have the child pick out the one that does not belong.
- 7. Use the sound chart mats at the end of this PDF and have your child match the letter to the sound.




























